## Romans 7.7-13 —Romans Series 40Understanding the Law 2

Romans 7:7 What shall we say then? Is the law sin? Certainly not! On the contrary, I would not have known sin except through the law. For I would not have known covetousness unless the law had said, "You shall not covet." 8 But sin, taking opportunity by the commandment, produced in me all manner of evil desire. For apart from the law sin was dead. 9 I was alive once without the law, but when the commandment came, sin revived and I died. 10 And the commandment, which was to bring life, I found to bring death. 11 For sin, taking occasion by the commandment, deceived me, and by it killed me. 12 Therefore the law is holy, and the commandment holy and just and good. 13 Has then what is good become death to me? Certainly not! But sin, that it might appear sin, was producing death in me through what is good, so that sin through the commandment might become exceedingly sinful.

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* The post hoc fallacy of logic asserts that because one event
follows another, it must have been by the other.
E.g., Because sunrise follows shortly after the crowing of the
rooster, the crowing of the rooster must have
the sun to rise. That kind of reasoning, in a more complex
form, is what Paul is dealing with in our text. In the life of Israel
as a whole, the giving of the law was followed by more,
guilt, condemnation, and judgment. So it would be very easy
to conclude that the law those negative results,
