- The Ten Commandments (Exo 20.1-17)

Mat 5.21 "You have heard that it was said ..., 'You shall not murder, and whoever murders will be in danger of the judgment.' 22 But I say to you that whoever is angry with his brother without a cause shall be in danger of the judgment. And ... whoever says, 'You fool!' shall be in danger of hell fire."
